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Phil's Jazz Chat

Two important figures in early jazz were Clarence Williams and Spencer Williams. Despite sharing a surname, they were not related. Both were pianists and composers. They co-authored the famous Royal Garden Blues.




Clarence Williams
was born in 1893 and
lived until 1965. He
was born into a
musical family and
performed in minstrel
shows from a young
age. Some of his
significant
compositions are

Sugar Blues, Baby Won't You Please Come
Home, Gulf Coast Blues and I Ain't Gonna Give
Nobody None of My Jelly Roll. His band
Clarence Williams Blue Five was important for showcasing up and coming superstars Louis
Armstrong and Sidney Bechet. During the
1930s he also made some notable recordings with washboard bands. One of his most significant influences was as a music publisher

of works by James P. Johnson, Willie "the Lion" Smith and Spencer Williams.

Here's Clarence Williams Blue Five, featuring Sidney Bechet, on Wild Cat Blues
Here they are again with Louis Armstrong on Cake Walking' Babies From Home.

Spencer Williams
was born in 1889 and
also lived until 1965.
He collaborated on
some of Fat's
Waller's early
compositions, notably
Squeeze Me.
Probably his most
famous composition



is <u>Basin St Blues</u>. Other famous songs are <u>Mahogany Hall Stomp</u>, <u>Tishomingo Blues</u>, <u>I've Found a New Baby</u>, <u>I Ain't Got Nobody</u>, <u>Everybody Loves My Baby</u> and <u>Shim-Me-Sha-Wabble</u>. He wrote for **Josphine Baker** in *La Revue Negre*. After vacationing in France with **Fats Waller** in 1932, he moved to England and later to Sweden in 1951.

About This Month's Bands 5th Aug The Stevedores Jazz Band



"The Stevedores Jazz Band" is a seven-piece traditional jazz band, enjoying an excellent reputation as one of Perth's top bands across the genre.

The Stevedores was formed in 1992 by Bert Nicholls (banjo). They were resident at the Railway Hotel in Fremantle for several years. After Bert's passing in 1999 his wife, Lynn, took over the management of the band, also filling the banjo position.

The Stevedores plays an up-tempo and accessible style of traditional jazz, for dancing

and all types of social occasions. They've played all over, including country weddings, winery functions, all sorts of private parties and corporate functions. 12th Aug That's Jazz



"That's Jazz" originated in Mandurah as a Trio (John Twycross, Harry Horne and Don Slaughter) in late 2003. They grew to a 7-piece

outfit and the Mandurah Jazz Club commenced in 2004. They've performed hundreds of gigs in such venues as the Atrium Basement, the Ballroom, the Silver Sands Hotel, Mandurah R.S.L., Bowling Club, Leslie Street Hall and the Bridgewater Lifestyle Village Auditorium. On more than a few occasions they have even been known to venture as far afield as downtown Yokine and Inglewood, to play at the Jazz Club of W.A.

The band plays a genuine and enjoyable style of jazz. There's plenty of traditional material and more than a touch of bossa and other stylings.

19th Aug Hills Big Band



Hills Big Band bring their style and groove to

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any occasion. It's Swing... and a whole lot more too. They present Count Basie and Glenn Miller numbers with verve and their two stunning vocalists skilfully cover the work of Frank Sinatra and Billie Holiday. And yet... the Hills Big Band also bring you great arrangements of pieces by the Beatles, Michael Bublé, Earth Wind and Fire, Duke Ellington, Bon Jovi, Steely Dan, Van Morrison, Louis Prima, Quincy Jones and James Morrison. They have grown to handle major gigs, for example filling the Ellington Jazz Club many times and featuring in the "Live at the Northbridge Piazza" series in 2012 and 2014.

Led by Musical Director Tom Salleo, future star trombonist/pianist and arranger, the members of the band are a disparate bunch from the Perth Hills and beyond. The players include professional musicians, teachers, ex-soldiers, university students, business people and retirees; all have a common interest in preserving and presenting all that's best in big band music.

The Troublemakers offer an enjoyable night of music. The lineup continues to evolve, and the music has developed as new faces have joined the band.

Many of the group have been playing together in all sorts of lineups for about a decade. They maintain their tradition of fresh, lively jazz, keeping it accessible and always fun. They offer a generous nod to the familiar standards peppered with a few toe-tapping and original songs in the style of the well-known greats.




In Profile: Bob Appleyard

Paul talks to Bob.

Q. Bob, what are your earliest recollections of getting into music?


I grew up in England, in Hastings, in Sussex, and I was the youngest child in a quite older family. My grandfather was born in 1885; that'll tell you how old they all were! I have a brother who's 13 years older than me, and like



many English families we had 3 boys all in one room, and at one stage we were all in

one bed! So, that older brother learned to play tenor sax, and was always listening to **John Coltrane, Miles Davis,** people like this, so even at age six, I was exposed to jazz. My family were heavily into the war-years and dance-band

music and things.
My uncle, you
may or may not
know, there was
a quite wellknown band
called the Frank
Chacksfield
orchestra, and
they had a couple
of hits; and my
uncle was his
drummer. So, as



a school-boy I had percussion lessons, and worked my way up and became principal percussionist for the **South of England Youth Orchestra**. And then I bought my uncle's old WWII drum kit off him when I was 13, and started to play more kit instead of timps, snare, xylophone etc...

Q. What happened next?

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When I was 16 my Dad said I had to get a proper job. So I was getting paid £2 10s for a 42 ½ hour week. I was learning how to fix



televisions for that.
Them my uncle rang
me up, and he said
"Robert, you can read
music...?" And I said
"Yeh...". He said "Can
you play a waltz and a
quick-step?", and I
said "well, yes, I

reckon". And he said "Do you have a tux?" And I said "Well I can go and get one" So I turned up for this gig with his band. Everyone in the band was about 60 and I was 16. It was a three-hour gig, with a fabulous dinner at this nice hotel in the middle of it, and they paid me £7, it was nearly three weeks wages of fixing televisions, and I went "Holy s***, I think I'll be a musician!"

So that was the start for me. I got more and more into playing bands and things. When I was 19, I was offered an opportunity to turn professional and I went to Hong Kong with a five-piece band to one of the big hotels. I was at one hotel for 2 years. Then the second hotel we

moved to we became a four-piece pop group, and I became the main singer. (I'd always done some singing from behind the kit but that was a bit of a step-up).

And then after another 2 years or so, our hotel was suddenly overrun by Americans. It was *Walt Disney on Parade*, and they were touring the world. And for just 2 weeks I met an Australian 18-year old blonde girl. I thought she was amazing, and after 3 months of them touring everywhere, I sent her a card with an airline ticket in it and I wrote "Please come back", and we've now been married for 49 years.

Q. Fantastic! Congratulations!

So that's how I ended up in Perth. I was a professional musician through the pub rock era, and I was in Perth's first major tribute band; I



was the drummer in the Beatniks for 2 ½ years, and Ice. And because my wife was a dancer, we

started our own production company and we started performing at hotels and casinos all around the world. We produced at <u>Genting</u> <u>Casino</u> in Malaysia, hotels in Singapore and Korea, and we spent a lot of time in Japan, and all of that.

And then, in around 1990, I decided that I'd had enough of performing, and I bought a record shop which became four record shops. And



now, it's a major music shop in Mandurah, where we have 200 students as well as a big retail business and PA hire, and all sorts of things. [Ed: website is Music Force]

I'm semi-retired now, though I enjoy playing once or twice a week. I do a lot of musicals. I still do a lot of pit work. I love doing all of that. I love playing jazz with **Round Midnight**, I'm in a

Q. Just the right amount... How long have you been playing with Round Midnight?

Ohh, I would guess about 10 years. Because my business is in Mandurah, I started playing with the **That's Jazz** boys from Mandurah. I was friends with **Harry Horne**, and I got into playing a bit of jazz with them. Brian filled in one day, and he obviously liked my singing and playing and he asked me to join this band.

Q. And we see you in the club with others...

Yes, I'm here with That's Jazz, and also with **Martin Jones** and the **Kent Street Riverside Stompers**. I used to be in **Mal Jennings'** band, before he passed away. And for a while when



Barry Cox had his heart attack, I filled in for him for a year or two with **Lloyd's** bands.


Q. And what's really keeping you busy?

Yes, the Talking Heads tribute is a new thing, it's a major thing for me now. I'm in the pit playing for a musical production for 2 weeks at the big theatre there. I'm doing a great show:

Best Little Whorehouse in Texas later this year. I love some reading - doing timps and xylophone and kit and all those things in that sort of show. Its great variety.

Q. You don't sound too semi-retired to me...

No, that's what my wife keeps saying (laughs). I



Q. And what do you listen to?

I obviously love listening to jazz, not so much the older jazz. I do like bits and pieces of **Louis Armstrong** and stuff, but I like **Miles Davis** and that sort of era, I really like big band music. I'm not really a big band drummer, but I love to listen to **Basie** and **Ellington** and **Sinatra** etc.. And then I listen to a lot of the famous 70s / 80s sort of bands: **Toto**, those sorts of bands; I love all of that music.

Q. Do you listen to any live music around Perth?



Well, my wife has been ill for the last 30 years, so if I'm not gigging or working, it feels right to be at home. So, no I don't get to go out a great deal for that sort of thing.

Q. Any other interests?

Well I treat my business as a life-long game of monopoly. I just love my music. I *used* to be an avid photographer, I've sort of lost interest in that nowadays. But I love sound. I do a lot of sound for schools and such. If they have a show, I'll go in with a big sound system, and mix it up for them. I also set up the stage for festivals: the *Kiwi festival* and *the Polynesian festival* for example.






SA Jazz Visitor

Paul is a reed player, a committee-man at the <u>Southern Jazz Club</u> (Adelaide), organizer of the <u>Australian Jazz</u> <u>Convention</u>, and a jazz broadcaster on <u>FM radio 5MBS</u>. (Paul's show is <u>Jazz at 4 – Traditional - on Tuesday afternoons</u>). Our clubs have a tremendous amount in common, and it was great to share insights and ideas.

Jazz Club in Melbourne - 1961

The <u>Australian Women's Weekly</u> (11 Jan 1961) discussed the return of jazz clubs after the impact of rock n roll, and the focus of this article

was a new club in Brighton, Melbourne. The striking mural was painted by a WA artist.

THE strongest revival is in Melbourne. where jazz clubs are mushrooming in many suburbs. One of the latest is the Basin Street Jazz Centre in Church St., Brighton, one of the city's southern seaside suburbs. Gay

murals, painted by Connell Lee, a 23-year-old artist from Perth, set the atmosphere of casual informality-but it is a very well-mannered informality. This has proved so popular that the membership shot up to 600 in the first nine

weeks - with many coming from northern and eastern suburbs.

The club was started - and is run - by three young men: Bruce Selleck, 32, Richard Dixon, 30 and Robert Ward, 24.

The centre is open on Friday nights from 9 to 12, mainly for younger members still at school; Saturday is supper-club night, open from 10.30 to 2.30; on Sunday, the most popular night of the week, the centre is always packed from opening at 8.30 to closing at 11.30. On Sunday afternoons, from 3 to 5.30, budding musicians who want to play before an audience can gain experience. About a dozen different bands have already had try-outs at Basin Street, among them several school jazz bands.

Members aged 16 to 18 pay 10/- a year and 15/- a year from 19 upwards. Admission charges are 5/- on Fridays and Sundays and 8/6 on Saturdays, which includes supper.

Members may bring guests for one session, and intending members may have one try-out to see how they like Basin Street before signing on the dotted line. 'Jazz' music is the only music the English dancing public want these days. They like the quick step, frown at old-timers!



[Editors note: The Basin St Jazz Centre in Church Street, Brighton was originally the Prince George Theatre, and was for many years a cinema. The jazz venue idea was an attempt to financially mitigate the impact television was having on cinema centres. Jazz was only there for a year or two; the venue soon reverted to screening movies. The building was completely rebuilt in 1979 to become the Dendy Cinema, recently renamed the Palace Cinema, Brighton]

At last, melted with Nat's Unforgettable.


My being swayed by new rhythms, blues, and beats
