Phil's Jazz Chat

One of the best ways to find out what's happening in the world of traditional jazz is, of course, to use the internet. Many of our readers use Facebook and there are several Facebook pages devoted to traditional jazz. Here are some you might like to check out...

Our Kind of Jazz is a group that honors and promotes Dixieland Jazz, New Orleans Jazz, Hot Jazz, Early Jazz, Traditional Jazz, Classic Jazz, Swing Jazz, Big Band Jazz, Gypsy Jazz, Ragtime, Western Swing, and music from the Great American Songbook.

Swing and Traditional Jazz is a Facebook group celebrating the music of the Swing Era, from the early 1930's through the end of WWII. Big bands, small bands, instrumental soloists, singers, radio and film stars of the era will all be featured.

Worldwide-New Orleans Jazz is a group which covers everything that has to do with New Orleans Jazz from outside New Orleans.

Trad Jazz Enthusiasts is a resource page for trad jazz fans and musicians alike! Post your favorite traditional jazz songs, tips on playing the style, and share charts with other musicians.

The Hot Jazz Appreciation Society is a group dedicated to the great music we call hot jazz, which is the blanket term for the jazz music that occurred between 1920-1935 (primarily in the late twenties and early thirties). This group focuses on the great artists that made this music possible, and focuses on their lives and their achievements, both during and after their musical primes. They also believe in the fostering and promotion of current music groups who are doing their part to preserve this culturally important work.

Hot Jazz Records (1917-1931) - This group is dedicated to the first jazz recordings, recorded between the years 1917 and 1931 during the so called Jazz Age. Many of those fine musicians who recorded in these first years of jazz made also records in later years. This group, however, intends to focus on this very particular time period only.

In Profile: Brian Copping

Paul talks to Brian.


Q. What are your first memories of playing music?

My father was a dance band saxophonist and clarinettist, and I learnt clarinet with him, and



then I ended up playing in a dance band with him. I then got recruited by a semi-professional big band; I was 20 years younger than everybody else. I played alongside **Ted Heath** and **Johnny Dankworth** and all

the top British bands once a month, and that was how I started - I was still at school in those days.



Q. What city was that in?

It was near Ipswich in Suffolk, England. The dance hall was in Felixstowe.

Q. So they were big band reading gigs?



Absolutely. I played second tenor. They used to shove me up the front to play the odd solo, because I was

young. But then I went to RMA Sandhurst and played in the jazz band there.

Q. Were you a full-time musician in the army?

No, I was an army officer. I was in Aden, and Belfast and things like that. I played everywhere I went; it wasn't easy at times. I really started to get back into it when I came to Australia.



Q. When was that?

In 1974, I married an Australian. I came for 2 years... and I'm still here.


I started playing Dixieland jazz, with **Johhny Healy** actually, we had a band called the *Climax Jazz Band*. Then I joined the 5th Military District

Band while I did a master's degree. I ended up playing with the **Will Upson** Big Band. And I played with a wonderful guy called **Ray Long**, who'd been **Shirley Bassey** and **Frankie Vaughn's** MD in the UK. I played with him for about 20 years. Yes, he emigrated here as well.

And I was lucky enough to play with **Sammy Davis Junior**, and I made up the numbers in the **Glenn Miller** Reunion Band. It was a very successful time. I also became an academic at that stage.

Q. So you did lots of shows?

Yes, I did. I had the opportunity to play flute in



the military band, so that helped with the shows.

And I ended up playing in the *Gumnut*Stompers when poor old Ross
Nicholson
could no longer

do it. I'd filled in with them for decades and wound up full-time for the last 5 years.

Q. How did Round Midnight get going?

It's been going for about ten years. It was originally the *Windy City Jazzmen*. We changed the name. There's been a few personnel changes over that time.

We've also got a little jazz group with **John Healy** & **Tony Eardley** called the *Jazz Masters' Jazz Trio*. We do history of jazz shows, and I do a jazz and a joke show. Its mainly for an older audience. In fact the University of the Third Age people who recorded our videos are here at the jazz club tonight (11 Feb).

Q. And what do you like to listen to?

Look, probably



everything. I lectured in jazz and music education at UWA, so I covered everything from the cotton fields to contemporary.



Coleman in the states. I was on the board of an American jazz association for 6 years. So I actually met and got to know people like David Baker and other great jazz educators. I met people like Slide Hampton through those people.

In fact some of the best music I've heard was *really* contemporary music played by avant guard groups in the north of Europe. So I listen to a spread. I listened to 3 hours of music coming back on the plane from New Zealand a couple of days ago (chuckles). So... fairly eclectic.

I met Benny
Goodman when I
was in London –
I'm a big Benny
Goodman and
Artie Shaw fan. I
spent the
afternoon with
Woody Herman



when he was here in Perth. I've been very luck in that respect, to not only hear these guys play, but to also meet them.

Q. We're always looking for ways to get younger musicians into traditional jazz. What are your thoughts on that?

I did it with the club, a few years ago. I ran a Dixieland group in a number of schools. I believe the blues band is still going. I ran one at Rossmoyne, and also a kid's band at Nedlands. I think **Phil Hatton's** initiative is tremendous. We might get a handful of kids out of that. The goalposts have changed a little, I suppose... but some good players will come out of it. We got some good players out of the schools like **Steve Searle** and **Dijon Summers**... they were in the band with me. I think it's a great initiative. I hope

it works. I support it. I've got plenty of charts available if they're needed.



Battle of the Bands

At the time of writing, we 're confident we'll get at least six, maybe more entrants. Phil has helped many of the teachers out with charts donated by members, or publicly available, and some guidance on how to get a group set up. Video submission entries are due on 11th April; and preliminary judging for the final four entrants will take place very shortly after that.

president from 199092 and was made a




life member in 1992. She lived in Belmont during her time with the club and she moved to Mandurah in later years.

Lady Sempill's Observations 1933

The Western Argus Kalgoorlie (14 Feb 1933) noted these observations from Lady Sempill:



JAZZ EVERYWHERE

"The world to-day," declared Lady Sempill, in a speech reported in the "Aberdeen Journal," "needs softness of beauty more than ever before. It is jazz everywhere. Not only in music but in dress. Look at men's stockings, pullovers and so forth! Also the

women's clothes offered for sale in windows! "It will take you all your time to find a plain bedspread, a plain cushion, or a plain carpet. It is azz, jazz, all the time. Look at the stage -- people cannot sing a song without jazzing about. The world- is full of mechanism, and mechanism tends to coarsen the mind."

Cavemen Jazzmen - 1932

The <u>Southern Districts Advocate</u> (Kataaning) published this poem (23/12/1932):

JAZZ:

Where the tom-toms beat in Africa's heat As the haze-hid sun goes down, It has meanings fine, which we won't define In this so-called "modern" town; For it tells in rhyme of the womb of time When the first hot passions grew, And the cave man's soul was a hollow bowl For beliefs he found were true. Do they stretch a hand from their spirit land, When the saxophone mocks the air? For I feel a pull and I must fulfil The urge that compels me there. And I think to-day as we glide and sway; But one thing I'd like to know— Are we far advanced from the thing they danced Ten million years ago?

Candidates must be financial members of the club at the time of nominating and be nominated by 2 other financial members. Candidates should complete the <u>nomination form</u> and send to:




