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Phil's Jazz Chat

Viewing the marvelous videos of the entrants to our upcoming **Battle of the School Trad Bands** (May 6th) reminded me that trad jazz was



originally youth music. In the post-World War One era it was the party music of young people. It was the music which annoyed their parents just as the music of Elvis, the Beatles, Sex Pistols, Madonna, Nirvana, Eminem etc. have done so in succeeding generations. Traditional jazz music at its best exhibits the vitality, optimism and exuberance of youth and certainly some of our entrants in the Battle of the Bands show this. These days the music has become associated with older people and that is mainly because these older people danced and partied to the traditional jazz revival which was the music of their youth through the 1950s and into the 60s. There is nothing more exciting and fulfilling to me than playing in or listening to a

good traditional jazz band as the music crescendos to a climax at the end. There is a



build up of energy to the point that you think it can't go any further and then a really good band takes it to an even higher level. This is a marvelous thing because it requires a group of very good musicians, who really understand the music and can improvise together in a way that is complementary and contributes to the overall effect. It requires a lot of experience, skill and intuitive interaction. Unfortunately, this symbiosis rarely happens in amateur bands and a lot of bands substitute loud and fast for the true energy which results from the above mentioned symbiosis. I came across a band called **Frazzes New Orleans Stompers**

recently, a Swedish band. They were playing the old chestnut, **Benny Moten's** *South*. I started listening and, after a minute or so, thought, "oh yes another competent but mediocre trad band". However, I continued to listen and, after a while these guys gelled and took off musically in a way that got me bouncing around on my chair! Everyone in the band was contributing mightily to the energy level and they did exactly what I mentioned before ... just when you thought it couldn't go to another level, it did! <u>Have a listen</u>.

When I was playing jazz festivals in the USA, I



often used to come across a band from Seattle called *Uptown Lowdown*. They were very good at this concept of building the momentum and energy. They had two excellent reed players, **Paul Woltz** and **John Goodrich** who both

played bass saxophones in addition to the clarinets and regular saxes. Sometimes they were joined at festivals by **Pieter Meijers** from Los Angeles on a third bass sax and these guys would play together in a way which built up a huge amount of energy and momentum, thrilling audiences. Here's an example.

An interesting phenomenon which results from the joy of this is that the musicians and audience often react when the song finishes by laughing or giggling. It's a wonderful feeling which, while rooted in the expression of youthful energy and exuberance, remains ever-present in the young at heart, no matter how old you are.

Do come and enjoy the youthful energy of some potential stars of the future at our "Battle of the Bands" night on May 6th.



That's Jazz originated in Mandurah as a Trio (John Twycross, Harry Horne and Don Slaughter) in late 2003. They grew to a 7-piece

outfit and the Mandurah Jazz Club commenced in 2004. They've performed hundreds of gigs in such venues as the *Atrium Basement*, the *Ballroom*, the *Silver Sands Hotel*, *Mandurah R.S.L.*, *Bowling Club*, *Leslie Street Hall* and the *Bridgewater Lifestyle Village Auditorium*. On more than a few occasions they have even been known to venture as far afield as downtown Yokine and Inglewood, to play at the *Jazz Club of W.A*.

The band plays a genuine and enjoyable style of jazz. There's plenty of traditional material and more than a touch of bossa and other stylings.

Straight Ahead is an 18 piece big band directed by saxophonist/arranger **Paul Millard** featuring

In Profile: Roy Burton

Paul talks to Roy.

Q. When did you first start playing music, Roy?

I took piano lessons when I was quite young. When I was about 16, I bought a trombone. I'd always liked the sound of the trombone. I had an old record player with 78 rpm records that I used to play along with.

Q. Whose records were you playing along with?

At the time, mostly <u>Graeme Bell</u>; the old *Regal Zonophone* label. Because of the work that I was involved in I wasn't really able to play all that much.

And also, when I came to Australia I wasn't in a band either. I just played whatever opportunity I got.

Then, the 1979 Australian Jazz Convention was




held in Fremantle, and Leon Cole organised a band to play at the convention, which he asked me to be in. That was called The Original Cornerhouse Jazz and Ragtime Ensemble.

Q. How did Leon get on to you? What was your connection?

I always used to just hang around and try to sit in whenever I got the opportunity. That's really what you have to do: you've just got to make yourself known and make yourself available. So I joined the band and by

1980 it had morphed into the *Cornerhouse Jazz Band*. Basically we were playing every Sunday at *the Railway Hotel*. That went on for years.



Q. How old were you then?

I was in my thirties... we just kept it going. There's been various musicians over the years but we've tried to maintain the same sort of sound over time. And here we are today.

Q. Indeed, and in the early 80s the Jazz Club of WA got going... you were key in kicking that off. What happened?

Well there's a lady who's here tonight (25 Feb), **Kay Lane**. She was the one who suggested having a jazz festival at York. We organised the first jazz festival there, and from that there was

so much interest in it that we decided we'd try and form a jazz club. That's how that started.

Q. Have you always sung?

I got into it by necessity really, because you have to have somebody who sings in the band, and when there was nobody else to do it I got dobbed in. You know what I mean. I quite enjoy it, so long as I know the words (chuckles).



Q. How about

the Jazz Cellar at Mt Hawthorn; that's been going quite a while, hasn't it?

Its been going for 30 years. Its still going strong, we're getting between 80 and a 100 every Friday night. It's a mixture of ages, too. Its not

just all old people or all young people, you know, it's a whole mixture, which is rather nice.

Q. We're trying to get more young people down to the club, especially to get them involved in playing. What are your thoughts?

I think that the established bands, if they need another



player, they'll scout around, and they may well find a young player that will fit in. Its pretty hard for all-young people to form a band and get a traditional sound. It takes a while to develop your sound. But if you can grab a person to go into an established band, it's like immersion therapy; you surround them with experience and that really gets them a good start.

We had fantastic interest in the competition and extend our appreciation to the school bands, and their teachers for 'having a crack' and submitting videos in April. Win or otherwise, it's a great experience to form up into a trad jazz band.

We'd love to see those who didn't progress have another go next year, Some were so young, that they've potentially got many years ahead to be a part of this competition!

And we really hope that some of the keener competitors talk their parents into bringing them down to some of our Tuesday night gigs to experience some live traditional jazz in the club. It's a great night, you'll all enjoy it, and maybe learn something.

Trad Pad With Graeme Bell


In 1962, a half-hour Saturday night TV special was launched, as reported in The Australian Women's Weekly (19 Sep 1962)...



"TRAD PAD" is a new Saturday night TV special, a half-hour of trad jazz compered by and featuring Graeme Bell and his All-Stars, one of Australia's finest jazz bands.


From left, members of the band are Bob Barnard, trumpet, Alan Geddes, drums, Norm Wyatt, trombone, Wally Wickham, bass, Laurie Gooding, clarinet, Harry Harman, banjo, and, seated in the centre, the old maestro, Graeme Bell. If you're a square and need a translation of "Trad Pad," "trad" is an abbreviation of traditional; "pad" is beatnik for a place of your own or a place where you feel you belong. In the new show, and it's a beauty, the pad is a jazz cellar run by Graeme Bell where lovers of trad jazz meet and listen. The All-Stars are featured largely, but each week there is a visiting jazz instrumentalist and singer, and some weeks a guest trad jazz band.

Trad Pad (later called Trad Jazz and then Just Jazz) broadcast around Australia from Sydney by channel 7 over 1962 and 1963 and helped to energise the 1960s trad revival in Australia.



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
